Trapping Matters Workshop



Committees

Become involved in Michigan TWS!

Any Michigan TWS member can join a committee. This is your chance to become involved in the chapter, develop important skills, network with biologists from across the state, and make a real difference for wildlife. Committees meet around once a month in a virtual format.



Information and Education Committee

This committee is tasked with employing methods to inform and educate the public on basic wildlife management concepts and on Chapter and Society activities and interests.

Awards Committee

This committee shall consist of a chairperson and at least 2 additional members. It shall review student travel grant awards, President's award recipient, and the Legacy award nominations.

Program Committee

This committee is tasked with arranging programs and planning our annual conference.

Nomination and Elections Committee

This committee is selected annually by the Executive Board to prepare a slate of candidates for each of the elective positions, namely: President-Elect, Secretary, Treasurer, and two additional Executive Board members from the membership of the chapter.



Conservation Committee

This committee is tasked with reviewing legislative proposals, administrative regulations, environmental assessments and impact statements, and other subjects or issues affecting wildlife or wildlife habitat within the organization area of the Chapter and make recommendations to the Executive Board for any action that should be taken by the Michigan Chapter. The Chairperson may ask any Chapter member to assist with review.

WHAT DO YOU DO?

In my role at MSU, I wear many different hats, but I'm mostly responsible for the day-to-day operations of the Undergraduate Advising Center, including: advising ALL current and prospective Fisheries and Wildlife undergraduate majors regarding academic programs and University policies; advising Fisheries and Wildlife majors during New Student Orientation; implementing activities related to recruitment and retention; assisting students with summer and permanent job placement; serving as Advisor for the Fisheries and Wildlife Club; serving as coordinator and lead instructor for the professional internship course; and serve as instructor for study abroad courses offered through the Department (mostly to Africa).

WHAT DO YOU ENJOY MOST ABOUT YOUR POSITION?

The reason I actively pursued such a career path, and absolutely love my job, are the students. I had mentors through my academic career that had significant impacts on me and my journey. I felt my contribution to the profession could be to help and support the next generation of fish, wildlife, natural resource and environmental professionals.

Fortunately for me, natural resources programs changed their advising model and started hiring professional advisors to work with their students. My first opportunity was at Penn State, and based on that position, I knew I'd made the right choice. I absolutely love working with and helping this community of young professionals. And, one of the bonuses of my position, because of my wildlife background, is leading study abroad programs. I've been very fortunate to be able to take hundreds of students on once in a lifetime conservation adventures to Africa, primarily South Africa and the greater Kruger ecosystem. The impacts of these programs have on students, and myself, are life changing.

WHAT WOULD YOU TELL CURRENT AND FUTURE PROFESSIONALS ABOUT BEING INVOLVED IN MITWS?

I believe all wildlife professionals (current and future) should be members of the Wildlife Society, at all levels, but especially at their local level. Having a strong network of wildlife professionals to connect with, work with, collaborate with and just BS with can only help you become a better wildlife professional yourself. To me, that all starts with the Wildlife Society - Student Chapter, Michigan Chapter, North Central Section and the parent society.

WHAT DO YOU ENJOY DOING IN YOUR FREE TIME?

Having worked on prairie chickens, sharp-tailed grouse, and sage grouse in my early years, the pursuit of game birds is my happy place. Calling in a Thunderchicken in the Spring, or chasing Pats, Timberdoodles and/or Ditch Chickens in the Fall over a good gun dog just can't be beat. When not in those pursuits, my wife and I enjoy traveling to various U.S. and international destinations (having visited all U.S. States, we're now working on U.S. Territories, as well as Canadian Provinces and Territories); fishing, taking in live music; sampling new breweries and eateries; or just spending quality time with our aging Gordon Setters.


